BURBANK SPEEDERS ARRESTED.

BURBANK, April 2.—The smooth stretch of the San Fernando road and its free out-in-the-country aspect hold out irresistible temptation to automobilists. The motorcycle force of policemen appreciate the fact or have heard rumors of the machines that move past Burbank, each a puff of dust a streak and a speck in the distance.

Wednesday found a pair of the motorcycle men out on the smoothest, most innocent-looking part of this country road and for a few hours the "pickin" was good. Several of Burbank's own citizens were surprised victims.
